

4.5 Computer, Internet access, training to teachers and students and any other programme for technology upgradation (Networking, e-Governance etc.):

- For effective teaching, a number of classrooms have white board, projector facility, mike systems and speakers. Teachers and speakers can use WiFi and internet facility provided by the University of Delhi.
- The college has three well-equipped air-conditioned computer labs loaded with INTEL P5 systems, printer, scanners, networking, white board, LCD projector and WiFi connectivity to students.
- The college supports EIMS software for admission, internal assessment, fees and payroll.
- Admission and IA Module of the EIMS software is updated as per the requirement of the college every year. The lab attendant & the administration staff involved in the operations of this software have trained by the college faculty.
- College has "COMPUTAX" software for tax calculation. Account section uses Tally 9.0 Software for managing financial transactions. Account section has been given training by the faculty of Computer Science Department of the college for the same.
- Library has "NETLIB" software for OPAC facility.
- The College has AMC for WiFi Server, computer systems, software and hardware.
- Technical upgradation training has been given to Accounts, Library and Administration staff from time to time depending upon software installed in these departments.







Criterion – VI : Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution.

The motto of the institution is "*Manas Ki Jaat Sabhae Eke Pehchanbo*" meaning "Behold All Human Race as One".

The **Vision** of the college is to emerge as a top commerce college in India and to help students imbibe moral and spiritual values having universal acceptance.

The **Mission** of the college is to offer excellent education to all and serve the society by developing future leaders in business, academia and industry with our commitment, dedication and devotion.

6.2 Does the Institution has a Management Information System?

Yes, the Institution has a well maintained Management Information System. The EIMS system allows an easy access to all students' information, attendance and internal assessment. Proposal for the software that allows marking attendance of the students, maintaining a record of their internal assessment and managing the time table on real time basis has been floated.

Free of cost license of *Google Suite* for Education was also procured for the college. G-Suite services include unlimited email domain based email accounts and unlimited drive space and more than 43 applications free for the college. Official domain based email ids were created for faculty members as well as committees/societies in the college for establishing formal communication channel internally as well as externally.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

All the departments within the institution follow the syllabi as designed by the University of Delhi. Many faculty members were active members of Board of Studies and Committee of Courses which designed restructuring of syllabus when Credit Choice Based System (CBCS) was introduced and ensured the implementation of the curriculum at the University level. The institution maintains regularity in sending feedback on the curriculum to the respective University departments.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Teaching and Learning is the core of the institution and hence, given the highest priority.

All the classrooms are ICT enabled and are used by faculty and students alike for a comprehensive learning.

The institution encourages learning outside the realm of classrooms as well. For this various seminars, conferences and workshops are conducted for the students as well as the faculty members. Prominent Resource Persons from academics and industry are invited on a regular basis to keep the students abreast with the developments in all the relevant fields.

The institution is equipped with software which helps the visually impaired students to study with ease.

The institution also offers various add-on and soft skill development courses for all round development of the students.

Regular feedback from students is taken in regard to teaching and learning methods and improvement strategies are made in accordance with the same.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Examination and evaluation are strictly conducted as per the framework of the University of Delhi.

The institution gives its faculty freedom to conduct internal assessment through presentations, open book tests, case studies, practical examinations or written tests as per the demand of the curriculum. The institution also conducts one set of the internal assessment examinations in a streamlined manner to give the students a complete practice of annual examination to follow. Two consecutive working days after the mid semester break are reserved for common written internal tests which are conducted for all the courses in synchronisation.

The examination committee and the internal assessment committee ensure the smooth conduct of all the examinations.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The institution has been regularly publishing its annual journal, '*The Journal of Business Thought*' and strides to make continuous improvements in the same.

Multiple Faculty Development Programs are organised all around the year for enhancing knowledge and skills of the faculty members from and outside the institution.

Four Innovation Projects under the aegis of University of Delhi with 12 faculty members and 40 students were completed during the year.

The Third Biennial Convention on the topic, "25 Years of Economic Reforms: Has India Taken Off?" was organised successfully.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

All the classrooms are ICT enabled and used by faculty and students alike for a comprehensive learning. Whole campus is WiFi enabled.

Biometric attendance software has been implemented for non-teaching staff.

EIMS software developed by Redox Technologies is being used for admission, internal assessment and payroll.

The college has Computax software from Perfect Solutions for TDS calculation and online submission. Tally 9.0 is also used for accounting purpose.

Library was fully computerized in 2001 through NETLIB Software. With this NETLIB Software the library has automated housekeeping services such as Acquisition, Circulation, Book Bank facility, Cataloguing, newspaper, serial, stock checking, barcoding etc.

For visually challenged students, library has separate laptop with special software including, LEX, Hindi OCR, NDVA, ABBY, Fine Reader etc.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Training and development programmes are organized regularly for the faculty members.

Staff members (both teaching and non-teaching) are encouraged to accept responsibilities beyond their usual responsibilities to help them to widen their knowledge and expertise in varied areas.

6.3.6 Faculty and Staff Recruitment

All recruitments are done through Selection Committees consitiuted as per the UGC and University guidelines.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

ENACTUS society of college executes many major and minor projects in collaboration with industry. *Suchita Project* to build two toilets of four cubicles each to cater to 2400 people in community was funded by Max India Pvt. Ltd. *Project Tabeer and Book a Plant* were funded by KPMG.

- A panel discussion on *"Demonetization of Indian Economy"* was conducted which enlightened the students with the intricate aspects of demonetization.
- Biennial Convention on "25 Years of Economic Reforms: Has India Taken Off?" was organised at Indian Habitat Center which was marked by the presence of eminent academicians and scholars from different institutes. The convention provided the audience an opportunity to understand the perspectives of industry experts regarding the various problems confronting the economy and their suggestions.
- College launched its Internship Programme- "Vittyan- The Financial Literacy Project" under which a seminar was conducted for the college employees to enhance their skills in digital technology.

In another motivational session, Bhuvan Bam–Youtube Sensation was invited.

ENACTUS connects students with entrepreneurial projects. This enables them to convert opportunities to reality and thereby empowering themselves and their communities. This year ENACTUS successfully pursued two projects, *Tabeer and Book a Plant*.

Placement Cell is also directed towards an ardent attempt to guide and motivate the students about the placement and career opportunities. Career Councelling sessions and pre placement talks are organised in collaboration with companies like KPMG, Delloite, E&Y etc. The *academic societies* also organised lecture series, workshops, seminars and conference in which experts from fields related to their course are invited. *Achievers Talk* is organised by URJA society every year in which experts from industry are invited. *Apple Talk* was organised by Department of Computer Science in which entrepreneurs from industry were invited. Addresses by renowned CEO of companies and entrepreneurs in these programmes help in bridging the gap between today's leaders and achievers and Gen-Z who are going to be the future leaders and change -makers by achieving something worth in their lives thereby inspiring others to follow their footprints.
