**2.14 Significant activities and contributions made by IQAC**

The committee adopted a four quadrant approach to initiate and implement the broad objectives outlined under the purview of UGC NAAC guidelines. The accomplishments under the respective broad categories are as follows:

**Infrastructure:**

- The faculty and college staff is becoming more tech-friendly as this is the need of the hour. Realising this necessity, the procured 75 iPads were distributed to faculty members. The IQAC members installed the iPads and also created individual iCloud IDs of all faculty members.
- The college has adopted *SmartProf* Application developed by Mobiquel. A custom application and second to none, is used to feed and display real time internal assessment records of all the students in the college. The application was installed for all faculty members including their timetables and student lists. It is being used by students through their personal logins. The application is available on iOS as well as Android platforms and works on mobile phones, iPads alongside a custom web interface.
- Technical committee was constituted under the aegis of IQAC for creating and maintaining website, creating domain based email ids for college and digitalizing Provident Fund Records.
- The Technical committee members undertook the exercise of successfully creating and activating 2284 email accounts and 41 Google Groups across the college.
- The construction of *Mata Sahib Kaur Girls' Hostel* with capacity of 129 has been completed.

**Empowering Students:**

- Event Calendar for all the events of committees prepared in advance for ease of Academic Semester: January-April 2017.
- Online Access to Attendance and Time Table through *SmartProf* Application and Website.
- All Students received Domain Based Email ID (*@sggsc.ac.in*) for academic and official communications.
- *SmartProf* Application was introduced for the first time under innovative digital initiative to 'Feed and Display' the Internal Assessment record of the Students in online/ offline mode in Real Time accessible anywhere-anytime.



- Google Suit license procured for the college enabled innovative classroom teaching tool to disseminate academic content through Google Classroom.
- The students have been giving feedback of the teachers through SmartProf.
- Placement Cell is also using SmartProf Application for placements related information and notices.

#### **Empowering Faculty:**

- With strong reinforcement of new Internal Assessment norms, the faculty members were able to innovate the evaluation methodology and this helped in reducing discrepancies by streamlining the process of internal evaluation.
- The iPads were distributed to faculty to enhance their technical skills and encourage them to do research projects. SmartProf application was also installed on faculty iPads to enable them to mark attendance online and feed internal assessment on daily basis.
- Faculty feedback by students at the end of each semester helps to assess their performance and encourages to improve upon their weak areas.
- The college has organised several workshops/FDPs for their knowledge and quality enhancement.

The EIMS system allows an easy access to all students’ information, attendance and internal assessment.

SmartProf Application was introduced for the first time under innovative digital initiative to ‘Feed and Display’ the attendance and internal assessment record of the students in online/offline mode in real time accessible anywhere-anytime. SmartProf is the easiest way to manage attendance, internal assessment, e-notices, placements, time-table etc. It is also being used to collect faculty feedback from students.

Official domain based email ids were created for Faculty members, students and committees/societies for establishing formal communication channel internally as well as externally. Google Communication Method Classroom is being used to spread information about college events and also to collect events information of the societies.

### **6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:**

#### **6.3.1 Curriculum Development**

All the departments within the institution follow the syllabi as designed by the University of Delhi. Many faculty members were members of Board of Studies and Committee of Courses that restructured curriculum during CBCS implementation at the University level. The institution maintains regularity in sending feedback on the curriculum to the respective University departments. A Syllabus Revision Committee for two PG Diplomas has been constituted.

#### **6.3.2 Teaching and Learning**

Teaching and Learning is the core of the institution and hence, given the highest priority.

All the classrooms are ICT enabled and are used by faculty and students alike for a comprehensive learning.



The institution encourages learning outside the realm of classrooms as well. For this various seminars, conferences and workshops are conducted for the students as well as the faculty members. Prominent resources persons from academic field and industry are invited on a regular basis to keep the students abreast with the developments in all the relevant fields.

The institution is equipped with software which helps the visually impaired students to study with ease.

The institution also offers various add-on and soft skill development courses for all round development of the students.

Regular feedback from students is taken in regard to teaching and learning methods and improvement strategies are made in accordance with the same.

Students are encouraged to make PPTs and present it in the class room.

Case Studies are discussed in the class rooms. Webinars are also organised.

### **6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation**

Examination and evaluation are strictly conducted as per the framework of the University of Delhi.

The faculty can conduct internal assessment through presentations, open book tests, case studies, practical examinations or written tests as per the demand of the curriculum. The institution also conducts one set of internal assessment examinations in a streamlined manner. The two consecutive working days after the mid semester break are reserved for common written internal tests which are conducted for all the courses in synchronisation.

The examination committee and the internal assessment committee ensure the smooth conduct of all the examinations.

### **6.3.4 Research and Development**

Research and development is the major focus area of the institution. Various activities are planned every year to inculcate research culture and enhance technical skills of faculty. The IQAC in collaboration with Research committee organized three workshops in this academic year. The first workshop was '*Train-The-Trainers at SGGSCC: World Bank Open Data for Research*' by World Bank Group in which the faculty members were taught on how to fetch multiple types of data from the website of World Bank. Two workshops were organised on advanced MS-Excel techniques. The Research Committee also started with *Lecture Series* to encourage research among faculty members.

The institution has been successfully publishing its annual journal, '*The Journal of Business Thought*' and strides to make continuous improvements in the same. The iPads were distributed to faculty to enhance their technical skills and encourage them to do research projects. SmartProf Application was also installed on iPads for feeding internal assessment on daily basis.

The Fourth National Conference was successfully organised in the month of February 2018 on the topic, "*Contemporary Reforms in Management, Economy and Applied Business*".

The college has Computax software from Perfect Solutions for TDS calculation and online submission. Tally 9.0 is also used for accounting purpose.

Library was fully computerized in 2001 through NETLIB Software. With this NETLIB Software the library has automated housekeeping services such as Acquisition, Circulation, Book Bank facility, Cataloguing, newspaper, serial, stock checking, bar-coding etc.

For visually challenged students, library has separate laptop with special software including, LEX, Hindi OCR, NDVA, ABBY, Fine Reader etc.

A new computer lab was constructed with a seating capacity of 45.

The girl's hostel is to be operational from July, 2018 and will be providing accommodation to nearly 129 girl students.

Two Add-on Courses - Marketing Stock Market and Integrated Course on Financial Markets in collaboration with Bombay Stock Exchange Training Institute are being successfully running in the college.

E&Y and KPMG organized Soft Skill Workshop for students and faculty.

- Seminar on Positive Thinking & Stress Management for students to help them in achieving their potential as a learner and maximising academic results.
- *Marketing Mavericks*, Social Awareness Campaign in support of ‘Rally for Rivers’ project launched by Isha Foundation to spread the message of saving our invaluable rivers by reaching out to the college students and faculty members in the college premises.

Sri Guru Gobind Singh College of Commerce aims to provide an environment in which entrepreneurial abilities of the students are nurtured and cultivated to cater to the needs of a growing economy. Primary goal is to tap the true potential of our students and equip them for the future by providing them with the necessary entrepreneurial skills, knowledge and values. These abilities are indispensable but at the same time available at a premium rate. Realising fully well that in the coming years entrepreneurial spirit among the youth will not only create job for them but it will also have a multiplier effect on the employment opportunities, the college has taken upon itself to inculcate these young minds with an infectious energy and optimism about the power of business to shape the world for good. Helping young students to become economically independent through employment and entrepreneurship is the principal challenge that the college seeks to address through the e-cell and ENACTUS.

Our *E-Cell* constantly works with a focus to provide a vibrant platform to meet the different needs of students for employability. It acts as a stepping stone for our students to fulfil their professional needs and goals. The E-Cell of the college organizes various lectures, conducts seminars and provides hands-on experience. Entrepreneurial Talk was organised in November 2017 in which noted personalities Harsh Beniwal (Youtube Viner), Priyanka Gill (Popxo Owner), Tarun Gill (Fitness Entrepreneur), RJ Ginni (91.1 FM), Appurv Gupta (Comedian), Ashutosh Gaur (Founder Firemud) and Aashish Beergi (Founder MASH) were invited. A seminar was also conducted in February 2018 in collaboration with Indian School of Business, Hyderabad to guide and motivate students. *ENACTUS* connects students with entrepreneurial projects. This enables them to convert opportunities to reality and thereby empowering themselves and their communities. This year ENACTUS is successfully running two projects – *Tabeer and Book a Plant*.

*Placement Cell* is also directed towards an ardent attempt to guide and motivate the students about the placement and career opportunities. Career Counselling sessions and pre placement talks are organised in collaboration with companies like KPMG, Deloitte, E&Y etc.

The *Academic Societies* also organise lecture series, workshops, seminars and conference in which experts from fields related to their course are invited. *Achievers Talk* is organised by URJA society every year in which experts from industry are invited. Addresses by renowned CEO of companies and entrepreneurs in these programmes help in bridging the gap between today's leaders and achievers and Gen-Z who are going to be the future leaders and change -makers by achieving something worth in their lives thereby inspiring others to follow their footprints.



National level Symposium was also organised in the college by IQAC for this purpose. Theme of Symposium was "*Quality in Higher Education: Road to Employability*". Experts were invited from various companies like, FICCI, Deloitte, KPMG, Earnest & Young etc.

#### 7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

The College is extremely concerned about the Environment and Environmental issues and makes efforts to sensitize students towards the same. The college makes conscious and voluntary efforts to ensure that more than 60% of the college area is left green. The college has a 10 acres campus. About 40% of this area is built up. The rest of the campus can be categorized as playgrounds, lawns and gardens. The campus is dotted with a large number of trees that are above six feet in height in addition to several species of shrubs and small plants.

*EcoCal* is an environmental community service program, undertaken by the college students. It aims at bringing together college and senior school students and small-medium scale enterprise/ organizations to help reduce environmental damage and take steps to minimize their impact on the environment by reducing resource consumption and adopting eco-friendly measures and practices. The students were informed about environmental issues and got training for conducting the task of auditing. Trained students conducted audits in organizations and provided their recommendations and suggestions to reduce the negative environmental impact. The audit was followed by a reaudit to assess the impact of the suggestions implemented. It helped the enterprises/ organizations to reduce their costs and promoted the 3R's (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle) of the environment.

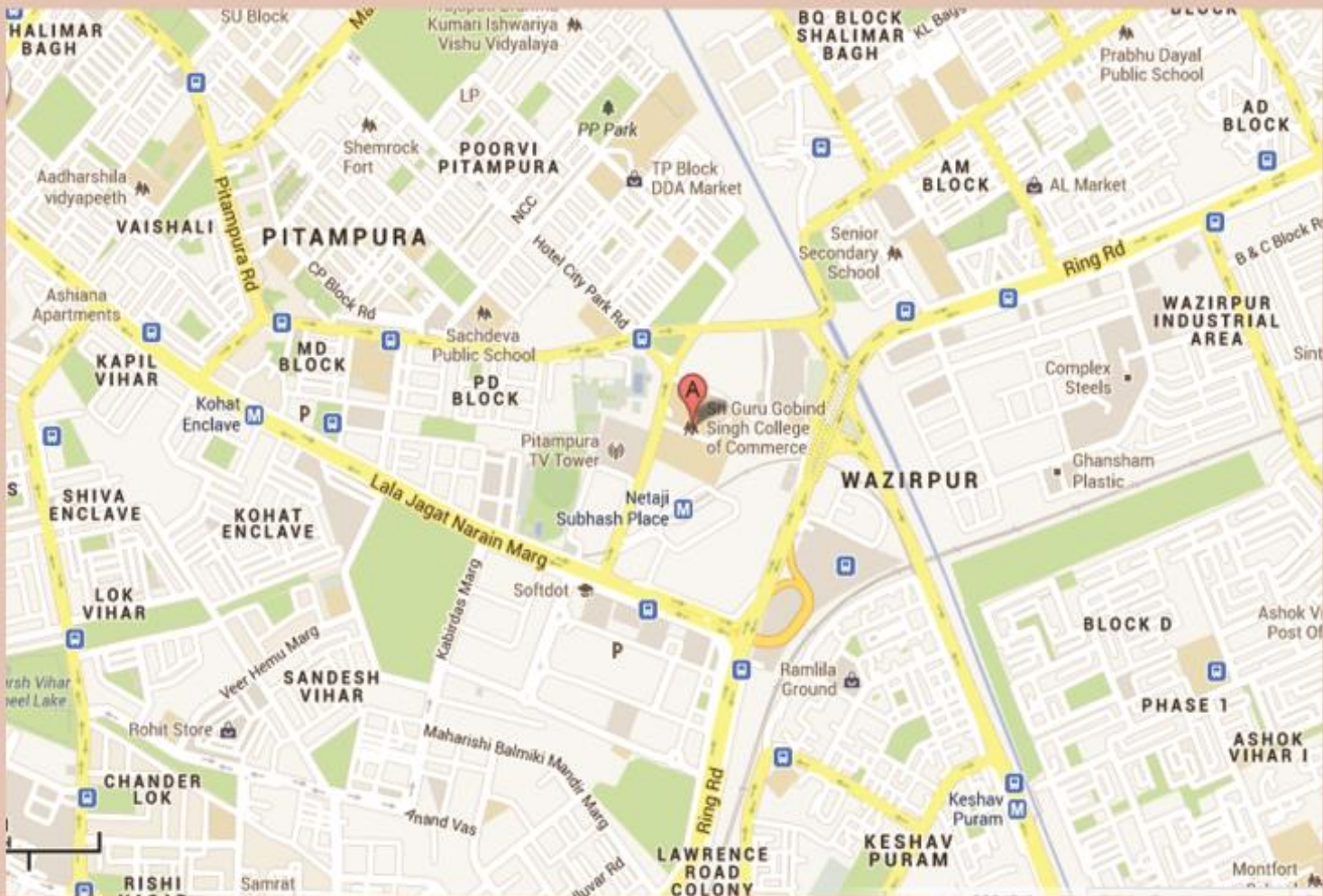
## **Annexure III**
